2025 State of business retention and expansion key questions


Key questions:

Since 2000, Shakopee added almost 20,000 new jobs.



Shakopee generally has a lower unemployment rate than the rest of the 7-county metro, indicating a particularly tight labor market.



Shakopee has experienced fairly consistent business growth, more than recovering from a 2008 recession dip.





Three industries (transportation & warehousing, manufacturing, and construction) account for almost half of jobs in Shakopee.


Employment by Industry Sector (Using NAICS Industry definitions) 2024




What is your business's industry sector? (Using NAICS industry Definitions)





Small businesses made up the majority of survey respondents.








Businesses experienced moderate growth in 2024 and expect the trend to continue in 2025.









Over half of business plan to keep their employee count stable, while an additional quarter plan to increase employees in the next year.

How do you expect overall staffing levels in your business will change over the next year?






Workforce availability remains a major challenge as 44% report increased difficulty finding employees while another 44% say it's the same as last year.

- Harder to find employees than a year ago




What are your business's greatest challenges and barriers to growth? Please include any barriers specific to your local community or Minnesota.

How has the cost of doing business changed in the past year?






Please explain the biggest factors currently driving up your cost of doing business, and how have they impacted your operations.

Insurance, labor costs, and supply chain/material costs are the three largest cost pressures.


To what extent have the following factors impacted your cost of doing business in the past year?

What are your future plans for your business?





- "Our goal is to survive. Hopefully, we can come out alive then sell as I get closer to retirement."




Businesses are facing a variety of cost pressures, but supply chain and insurance costs are having the most significant impact.

To what extent have the following factors impacted your cost of doing business in the past year?













Cost Impact: Supply Chain/Material Costs
